A Fiber Optic Hub Box, also known as a distribution box or splitter box, functions as a central junction point in the network. Its key roles include:

- Converging multiple fiber cables and splitting optical signals to multiple outputs or combining signals from multiple inputs.
- Supporting passive or active splitters to distribute signals to several subscribers from a single optical line terminal (OLT).
- Providing robust environmental protection for internal components, ensuring reliable long-distance transmission. Hub boxes are generally larger, outdoor-rated cabinets used in network aggregation points or distribution hubs, rather than at the end-user premises .
