According to the National Electrical Code (NEC), cable trays are distinct from raceways because they are not fully enclosed and must remain accessible for inspection, maintenance, and cable management (NEC Article 392) . Enclosing a cable tray completely would violate these accessibility requirements and could create safety hazards, such as overheating or difficulty in performing maintenance . Cable trays should never be permanently enclosed, although they can pass through walls or partitions if proper fire-stopping measures are implemented .

Heat Dissipation and Cable Safety

Cable trays are designed with open structures—such as ladder, ventilated trough, or wire mesh trays—to maximize airflow and prevent overheating . Fully enclosing a tray can trap heat, reduce ampacity, and increase the risk of insulation damage or fire. Solid-bottom trays provide some protection against debris or fluids but still are not considered fully enclosed and have stricter fill limits to manage heat .

Alternatives for Enclosure



If protection or aesthetics is required, alternatives include:

- Cable trunking: Fully enclosed systems designed for neat routing in visible areas, often used in offices or commercial spaces .
- Conduits: Provide maximum protection in harsh or outdoor environments but are more labor-intensive and costly . These alternatives allow for cable protection while maintaining compliance with safety standards and code requirements.

Summary

While cable trays can support a wide range of cables—including power, control, and fiber optic—they should not be fully enclosed. Their open design ensures proper ventilation, accessibility, and compliance with NEC standards. For situations requiring full enclosure, consider using cable trunking or conduit systems instead .
