

Connecting a gigabit fiber optic switch to a router

- **Router Configuration:** Access the router's admin panel (commonly 192.168.0.1 or 192.168.1.1) and configure any required settings. Some ISPs may require PPPoE credentials, while others use automatic registration . Enable QoS if you prioritize VoIP or video traffic .

Placement and Maintenance Tips

- Place both ONT and router in a dry, ventilated area near power outlets, ideally with surge protection .
- Avoid bending or stressing fiber cables; handle connectors carefully to prevent signal degradation .
- For larger homes, consider mesh Wi-Fi systems to extend coverage .

Troubleshooting

- **Check ONT lights:** solid green indicates power, PON/Optical light confirms network registration .
- If the connection fails, verify cable seating, router WAN port selection, and ISP credentials if required .
- Contact your ISP if you lack PPPoE credentials or encounter registration issues . By following these steps, you can establish a stable, high-speed fiber connection and fully leverage gigabit internet performance throughout your home or office.
