- Choose materials resistant to fading, moisture, heat, and abrasion. Thermal-printed labels or heat-shrink tubing are ideal for permanent installations .

- Label formats include wrap-around, flag, or heat-shrink labels, selected based on cable diameter, routing density, and environmental conditions .

Placement and Best Practices

- Place labels close to connectors, typically within 8 inches, and on both ends of the cable .

- Maintain a consistent naming and numbering system across all cables and update documentation whenever changes occur .

- Conduct regular audits to verify label integrity and ensure documentation matches physical labeling .
